

## Peace, History Come Together at The First Women's National Conference at Norfolk, Virginia on November 29 to December 01, 2007

**D**escendants of Colonial settlers and American Indians came together Saturday for a conference and reconciliation ceremony at [Norfolk, Virginia](#). The three-hour event at the Holiday Inn Select was an effort in "acknowledging that we all belong in the circle of life," keynote speaker Angela Daniel said to attendees.

"It's never too late for peace," said Daniel, an adopted member of the Mattaponi tribe and an anthropology doctoral student who co-wrote "The True Story of Pocahontas: The Other Side of History." The event was held in Norfolk because of its proximity to

**Jamestown, where Europeans encountered Indians 400 years ago. It was sponsored by the Women in Ministry of the American Clergy Leadership Conference and five other organizations.** The program, which focused on American Indian women, had tribal dancing and a gift presentation from descendants of the country's Founding Fathers. The Apache, Arapaho, Blackfoot, Cherokee, Cheyenne, Chickahominy, Lakota Sioux, Omaha, Pueblo and Seminole were among the represented tribes.

### Did you know the Native American Princess, Pocahontas?




Pocahontas (1596-1617)

**M**any people have seen the popular Disney movie, Pocahontas. But, here is the true story of an Indian princess and the English settlers at Jamestown. In 1607 the English established a colony at Jamestown, Virginia. But the harsh winters were more difficult than the settlers had planned and they soon found that their supplies were becoming dangerously low.

One day, during 1608, Captain John Smith and some of his men were captured by Native Americans while they were out searching for food. Captain Smith's men were all killed and he was taken to Chief Powhatan. The mighty Indian Chief ordered that Smith be killed. At the last moment, the Chief's daughter, 13 year old Pocahontas, pleaded with her father and saved Captain Smith's life.

Pocahontas will always be remembered as the Indian princess who risked her own life to save Captain John Smith and the settlers of Jamestown. But the really notable aspect of her short life is that she was the first Native American in the new world to be [converted](#) and accept [Jesus Christ](#).





## Did you know Hawaii's Last Queen, Liliuokalani?




Liliuokalani (1838-1917)

Liliuokalani, Hawaii's last sovereign queen was born on September 2, 1838 in [Honolulu](#). She received her education at the Royal School. She was a Christian and in 1862, she married John Owen Dominis, the son of an American sea captain.

When her brother King Kalakaua died in January, 1891, Liliuokalani ascended to the Hawaiian throne. Government ministers insisted that Liliuokalani immediately sign an oath to uphold the constitution that had been forced upon her brother. Under the constitution, Liliuokalani wielded little power. She formed a Cabinet three times, and each time it was rejected by the Legislature. She drafted a strongly royalist constitution, but no one supported it.

The queen withdrew to her residence, Washington Place, and urged her supporters to be patient and avoid bloodshed. A fierce uprising was firmly squelched in January 1895, and although she denied playing a role in the attempted takeover, Liliuokalani was arrested and taken to a second-floor room at [Iolani Palace](#). It would serve as her jail cell for nearly a year. During her confinement, the queen wrote one of Hawaii's most beloved songs, "Aloha Oe" ("Farewell to Thee").

# Global Peace Festival

The Global Peace Festival just concluded in Manila. The Festival in the Philippines had very broad sponsorship and support from NGOs, key Filipino elected officials, religious leaders and their organizations and government agencies.

A series of conferences were held concurrently throughout the week including the International Leadership Conference, the International Professors and Educators Conferences, the 2nd Youth Power Assembly and the International Youth Leadership Conference. The event site was visited by the President of the Philippines, the Honorable Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo and a special address was given by Mr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in which he called on spiritual leaders to be thermostats and not thermometers so they can take the lead and “set” the temperature for peace.

Speaker of the Philippine House of Representatives Jose de Venecia, Jr. gave a most powerful address that was carried on the editorial page of the Manila Bulletin, Manila's most popular daily newspaper. The event culminated with the **“One Family Under God”** address by Dr. Hyun Jin Moon, which was received with great enthusiasm.

The main paper ran over-the-fold headlines in the days leading up to the event and gave fine coverage the day after. The nation was touched en masse and at the highest levels. The Global Peace Festival has begun a global series of peace movement activities to lift up the role of the family, the importance of interfaith dialogue, service and youth leadership, and the strengthening of moral character-based leadership to achieve a culture of peace and reconciliation of all nations, faiths and races based on true love and the heart of “Living for the Sake of Others.”

The 33rd Middle East Peace Initiative is now being held in Tiberias, Jerusalem, and Ramallah. Active engagement of faith leaders, NGOs and elected officials is once again in full motion.

We were welcomed by the leadership of the Druze community at their most holy site and conducted an interfaith service at the Church of the Annunciation in Nazareth. It was beautiful to see Dr. Glaubach, a Jewish scholar; a Muslim cleric from Kazakhstan; a Buddhist priest from Japan; and a prominent Christian bishop from Nazareth all offer prayers for the unity of God's people and appreciation to God for sending Jesus.

Through the consistent efforts of MEPI, trust is being solidified on all sides. Over 170 delegates are now attending from 41 countries. Breakthroughs are being experienced that are coming on the foundation of the many years of MEPI development and the work of the **American Clergy Leadership Conference**.

Holly, civil rights leader and pastor of the Little Rock Baptist Church in Detroit, was joined by Imam Dawud Assad of the Islamic Center of Central New Jersey. Mrs. Anjun, a prominent Muslim leader from the United Kingdom, also contributed greatly. She is the first Muslim to be part of the official staff of the Anglican Church.


