My beloved Family,

It's late Sunday evening after a full day and week. George is in the living room preparing for his students. I'm glancing over the calendar at the month's activities. My heart brims over recalling how full this month has been with so much that is never placed on the calendar. How concerned our Heavenly Father is for even the smallest things of our lives -- how clearly He manifests this concern in all the tiny ways that He stimulates our growth and direction. From this example of His demonstration of concern, I pray that I can learn to be equally concerned about Him and His heart and for His children.

The big news from the Philadelphia front is a move to a new Center for the happy reason that we outgrew the first one! Max, Trisha, and their two-year-old Jubal (Dugaw) will be joining with us in a lovely six-room apartment to lay the foundation of four as a base for Father's work here. Father really prepared the place for us; it was the first one we looked at late one Friday evening. We took it even later, and within the next 24 hours, it had been cleaned and blessed. We were so pressed for time that moving meant one, two or three loads an evening, generally after midnight. So, while the world slept, a most significant event was taking place in the history of this City of Brotherly Love. (There are reasons to believe, though, that Satan wasn't sleepy and was upset about it all.)

Of course, one of the highlights of the month's activities was joining with the NYC Family and Pauline Phillips for a most unusual Children's Day in Washington Headquarters. We arrived late Friday evening to find the Center in a carnival atmosphere with pumpkin and witch figures, paper chains, paper and paints everywhere, costumes being fitted, and of course food, song, and laughter. The occasion was a bazaar in the YMCA basement all the next day. We united in the effort, and had a full day. This unique Children's Day perhaps is a reflection of the new trend in the Family to be much more aggressive in the world and there to meet people on their own ground, compete and share with them spiritually and physically.

Saturday evening we gathered to join our hearts with the struggles and victories of our sisters and brothers in Europe through a report from Miss Kim. He impressed upon us the privilege and the advantages of these times when we for the first time in history can become the true children of God. Through his experiences of the early growth of our movement, he above many, I know, understands the price and thus treasures this privilege. He spoke of the need to establish and maintain an intense circuit with God so that His spirit might be released more and more until we can realize His final victory on God's Day. However, before that day we must be prepared to persevere even against great persecution that first may come.

Pauline Phillips blessed the Center with a brief visit to Philadelphia at just the right time to help us present the conclusion to our Free University class. (Actually, she introduced a new boy to the Principle in another room while we went on with the conclusion.) The final class was made up of three of the original fifteen that showed interest at first. But for even one of these to end up as a brother or sister, how happy we'll be! Two or perhaps three of these will go on to deeper study -- we pray that Father may make a victory from this first campus effort here.

Pauline also spent our last night in the old Center with us -- keeping us excited talking far into the early morning hours. I don't know how much due to her visit, but everything has been different since. We have a direction that we didn't have before.

George and I have now joined the St. Louis Family in studying Korean. Our sun sang nim is a student from Korea and our pay is to teach him Divine Principle. Pretty fair exchange, I'd say!

(It was a joy to see you, Travis! Keep up the good fight for Father!) Lynne Barnhart, a friend of Travis' who is also studying the Principle in Chicago, spent the day with us as well.

REPORTS FROM EUROPEAN FAMILY:

MISS KIM'S TOUR

AUSTRIA

October 5, 1967:

For a long time we waited, longing for our Leader to come to us. At last we heard that our Leader and his Family left Korea for Japan. Great joy and eager work were the answer, while we were waiting for further news. Then, in the Sung Wha Monthly we saw pictures of our Leader and his Family during their stay in Japan. What joy!

Then Miss Kim's coming was announced, and we prepared to receive her. At last the time was here. On October 5, early in the morning, two Volkswagen buses with Paul and Christel Werner, Inge Eisner, Bernhard Maierhofer, Inge Meyer, Harald Unger, Emmi Steverl, Beate Paul, Marianne Kolup, Christa Meglic, Edeltraud Stimpfl, Waltraud Horina and Aurelia Henßkel left Vienna towards Salzburg, to receive Miss Kim at the Austrian border. Klaus Werner had to go to school, and also Elfi Schultermandl, Romana Maierhofer, Friedl Weber, Ingrid Bauer, and Franz Wasenegger couldn't come along, because they couldn't get off time from work.

Hilde Maierhofer from our Center in Linz was picked up on the way to Salzburg. Alfons Carda, also from Linz, had to go to work.

All of us were full of expectation and prayed in our hearts that we might feel the real significance and greatness of the coming moments. Our small group of simple and unimportant people will be the first ones in Austria to see Miss Kim. What a privilege! Such and similar thoughts filled our hearts at that time.

We arrived at the border. The expected blue Ford Taunus (the Frankfurt car) wasn't there yet. While we walked to the crossing point, a cloudburst came down and we had to go back to our buses. Full of expectation, we watched the cars crossing the border.

All of a sudden the great moment was here, and we stood in front of Miss Kim. Christel presented her a bouquet of roses. Paul greeted Miss Kim, and then she walked over to us and shook hands with each of us. Full of joy we greeted Peter, Elke and Barbara (from our German Family) too. Then suddenly the cloud cover broke and the sun came shining through.

What did we all feel at that time? We met a woman, simple, natural, and yet completely different from all people we have ever met.

On our way home to Vienna Miss Kim visited the Center in Linz very briefly and prayed. At about 7 p. m. we arrived in Vienna. We had supper, which Romana and Elfi prepared with much love. Now we were united with the ones that had had to stay home. All of us were filled with great joy, and we made plans for the next day. Miss Kim wanted to get to know each one of us personally. That evening she retired soon.

October 6, 1967:

Right after breakfast we had a question and answer session about Principle. How wonderful it is to come to a deeper understanding of the Principle through Miss Kim! She makes us realize very plainly that our inner world is the real world we live in. She gives us so much, and we realize that we have to process these great thoughts within us in order to absorb them and align ourselves with them. That's why we're so grateful to Emmi for stenographing everything -- especially the new ones are glad.

After dinner the whole Family walked to the Holy Ground with Miss Kim. About two years ago she stood at this very spot with our Leader. At that time our Leader blessed ground all over the world. We stood there and prayed silently.

After dinner we had another meeting. Some of us sang a solo to Miss Kim, Harald in Turkish. A little later Alfons arrived from Linz.

It was so wonderful to experience how Miss Kim directed our questions. We sat there and felt how our heavenly Father works through one person and reprimands us sometimes too. At the close of the meeting Inge Eisner gave her testimony.

October 7, 1967:

This morning we listened full of joy to Miss Kim telling us about the work in the Washington Center and other cities in the USA, about the methods they are using and their progress. She also talked a little about our Japanese Family.

We realized even more clearly now that the Kingdom of God is being established spiritually as well as physically and that we should be lord over all creation. We should use all our talents for this purpose.

In the afternoon we heard about prayer and we realized what it means to suffer with someone. It is a spiritual experience. To love means to take part in the joy and the suffering of our brothers and sisters. Then followed a wonderful hour. Miss Kim talked about the significance of the Tree of Life and the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil.

We all realized that our task is not easy. But was there ever a more rewarding one? This evening Johan van der Stok arrived from Amsterdam.

October 8, 1967:

Plans for the future were discussed this morning. Just like all the Families in America, united into one Family, all European Families should grow together and bring about a united Europe. One Family can learn from the others and more and more we will be one big Family under God.

Then we asked Miss Kim for advice in regard to our physical bodies. She stressed the importance of physical health and even demonstrated some exercises to us girls in order to keep fit. It was wonderful.

Before dinner Miss Kim visited our first Austrian Center, where she also prayed. In the afternoon, we once again had the opportunity to ask questions. To what extent can we understand the nature of God? Miss Kim explained the significance of the four positions and of our Leader's Family in their special positions in the most wonderful way. Then we took a walk to the park of the castle Belvedere and in the evening we had our Sunday open lecture, given by Bernhard. After dinner we talked about our spiritual experiences and dreams about our Leader and Miss Kim. This night Johan showed wonderful slides of our Washington Family and our Leader's home in Washington.

October 9, 1967:

We went for a walk to the castle Schönbrunn. On the castle grounds some of us danced a Vienna waltz upon Miss Kim's request, and Johan took some pictures.

The last night with Miss Kim was very special. She told us about our Leader. His whole life belongs to his mission. He is very sad that he couldn't come to us this year, but Father sent us Miss Kim.

We were so happy to hear Miss Kim sing her favorite song to us and then "Lullaby and Good Night" in Korean. Her closing prayer touched us deeply. She expressed her thanks for her stay with us, to get to know the Family and that Paul and his family had taken the message to Austria. Her prayer is very powerful. After Miss Kim retired that night, the whole Family went to the Holy Ground to pray.

October 10, 1967:

We departed with thankful hearts. These days were a wonderful experience for all of us. We could feel the love and the longing of our Heavenly Father and felt urged to work even harder for Him. Everyone wants to give all he has to bring joy to His heart.

ITALY

Dear brothers and sisters,

I would like very much to share with you the moments we shared with Miss Kim. She arrived with the Austrian and German Families on the evening of Wednesday, October 11. After a great meal, we all retired to our rooms.

In the morning after breakfast we went to the Holy Grounds, Villa Borghese and then the Vatican. Later, for lunch we went to a lake just outside Rome, returning to Rome at about four in the afternoon. Time was spent talking privately, asking questions and discussing the future.

In her very quiet way, it seems as though Miss Kim has changed all of Europe. So many people have been moved to other mission fields. That night we had a Family meeting -- just intimate members -- so that we could ask many deep questions about Principle. The next morning I accompanied Miss Kim and Marion to get visas for England.

It was really a great moment, as there were many different Centers represented, so we could all share our experiences and how to best witness, teach, etc. Friday night again another meeting with many other members -- there were about thirty of us in all. Sunday afternoon many decisions were made, so after the open meeting Doris and Johan left for Amsterdam to be with Teddy, Marion to England. I returned to Rome, and Barbara returned to assist me in Rome.

These were really beautiful days, and the Father's Spirit and love were so strong amongst us; and we learned many new things. You are very lucky to have Miss Kim always with you. We loved having her very much, and her presence here was of the greatest importance to iron out problems, to understand more about our Master, and to plan about the immediate future.

So now that we have been fed and revitalized, we are fishing, fishing, fishing for Father's children before he comes. Our love and prayers are always with you.

Miss Kim's Visit in Frankfurt

Hello, brothers and sisters!

All last summer we were waiting for our Leader and his party to visit us here in Germany and finally we heard that it had not been possible for him to come this time, so of course we were very disappointed. But then we heard that Miss Kim would come, and we were all very happy again.

Most of us just knew her from pictures or by her articles in the Newsletters. We must confess that we were a little bit afraid of her, too!

We did not know the exact date of Miss Kim's arrival here in Germany because she visited some other countries in Europe first, and so our excitement grew from day to day. At last Peter had a telephone call from Teddy in Holland that he could go and meet Miss Kim there with the car. From then on we could count the days till her arrival, because we knew that she just had to go to Essen and Hamburg first, so it could not be much longer than a week. Friday, the 29th September, around six o'clock at night, she arrived here at the Frankfurt Center. The first minute we realized this harmony, this happiness going out from her, even after such a long journey, we felt it was wrong to be afraid of her.

In the beginning of September we had got a new flat here in the same house, so with two big flats it was not difficult for the Frankfurt Family to have room enough for all the guests who might come. The night of Miss Kim's arrival we were fifteen for dinner. We were all waiting a little bit impatiently for her to speak to us. So after dinner she told us a lot about the Washington Family, their activities there and how they spend most of their days.

The next morning after breakfast there was time for some of us to talk over questions and problems with Miss Kim. We were very thankful for her understanding and for the help she could give us to bring us forward on our way to Father. Some of the others had gone to meet more guests, so at lunch time Miss Kim talked to us girls about our special tasks. It was not without humor that she stressed three important points for girls -- looking attractive, having a good heart, and being good cooks. We realized that we all had still a lot of work to do on ourselves.

After dinner that night we got together and there was an opportunity in a big circle to ask more questions. We were talking about the methods to explain the Divine Principle to new people. Miss Kim gave us a deeper and fuller explanation of give and take and of the restoration of the whole creation. Miss Kim answered all our questions with great wisdom, simple and clear for everyone. We closed that night with a prayer to thank our Heavenly Father.

Sunday morning we began our day on the Holy Ground in Frankfurt, to ask Father's blessing on our True Parents and on all our sisters and brothers everywhere in the world, so that He might give us wisdom, love and strength for our mission. The rest of the morning went by with questions, this time mostly about prayer. In the afternoon we had five more guests, and Miss Kim talked about her own experiences and about her life. She stressed different points of God's existence and His true love for each of us. Sunday night some of the guests had to leave, and the rest spent most of the evening with Johan, who showed us slides from Washington.

On Monday, some of us had to work, so it was only after dinner that we were all together again. Ernie Stewart had invited some English-speaking people, most of whom were Bahai's. Here we could see again how difficult it is to show a better new way to those people who are already so very settled in their own opinions.

Miss Kim talked that night about the various points we have to watch while our personality is growing. With impressive words she explained the importance of a healthy physical body to give our spirit the possibility of free development. She told us the need of a good education and a good profession which will help us with our big tasks in our mission. We will have to use our time wisely, so a good organization will help us a lot in our teamwork. We have to try harder to be in harmony with Father's Will, to make no basis for Satan to work on, and to practice daily our love to Father, to the people around us and to the whole creation. We all felt that one or the other point was especially stressed for us. We saw again clearly how our Father and our True Parents in Korea expect us to help effectively to restore all mankind and how they watch our development and our growth to perfection with longing love. Wednesday was the last day of Miss Kim's visit to Germany. We spent that night singing together. We were filled with deep sadness, but at the same time with new courage and energy for a new, better start.

Thursday morning, Miss Kim, Peter, Barbara, and Elke left for Vienna after a short, hearty good-by. While we were waving, the thought came to our minds, When and where would we see Miss Kim again?

Dear Family,

At the beginning of this month, Miss Kim had advised me in a letter that she would arrive at Barcelona on the 21st of October. So I could hardly believe my eyes when she suddenly stood in front of me already on the 17th! I was of course more than happy to see her again after more than two years, and there was a lot to talk about. First of all, I had to rush off to Rosita to borrow some dishes and bedsheets, as I had just moved to another flat and owned only the most essential household objects. Then I phoned Rafael and Jordi who came over right after work to meet our guest and to help making a schedule of meetings and sightseeing trips. Fortunately, I could get three days leave after explaining the situation to my boss.

Wednesday afternoon and evening we invited Maria, Enrique and some others for a question and answer session for more advanced Divine Principle students. The following morning was dedicated to seeing the Spanish Village, a model town of famous houses and churches from all over the country. Later on, Rafael accompanied us to the Museum of Ancient Art and explained its famous collection of 12th century paintings. Next day we made a trip to the monastery of the Montserrat Mountains, the most important Catholic center of this province, Cataluña. The Virgin of Montserrat, a black statue, attracts many pilgrims; one even has to stand in line to get to see this shrine. Almost everybody kisses this statue when passing by. Due to bad weather we could not drive up to the mountaintop to enjoy the whole scene which served as a background for Wagner's opera "Parsifal," but nevertheless we spent the time very well by asking Miss Kim many questions while we were waiting for our train in a coffee shop. At night we saw a very good movie in Japanese with Spanish subtitles.

Saturday we had a big meeting with old and new people and many lively discussions. So far I had been teaching the Principle on an individual basis or in small groups of two or three. This week almost all got to know each other at the various meetings and private talks with Miss Kim. Now I am very pleased to have a big living room.

Sunday morning we had a look at Gaudi's strange Holy Family Church, the facades of which are covered with many symbols. This temple was started at least sixty years ago and is still under construction. I wonder whether it will ever be finished at all. We just don't live in a time when we would need another big cathedral. On the way to Montjuich, one of the highest points of the town, we had a marvelous view over the Mediterranean Sea and the city of Barcelona. In the afternoon I took Miss Kim to a bullfight. Most tourists go to see it, but the great majority of Spaniards are very much opposed to this cruel "sport." It turned out to be quite exciting: three bulls jumped over the fence into the passageway, one torero was hurt twice by the bull but continued fighting, all three of the bull-fighters were honored for bravery, and one bull's life was spared. This happens perhaps once a year that a bull can leave the arena alive. In front of us was a young American couple who also listened to my comments in English. When we found out that they are stationed at Baumholder in Germany, we immediately gave them the address of David Flores, who is also over there. Well, chances of witnessing are everywhere -- even at a bullfight!

After a short snack on our way home, we were ready for the last meeting. Miss Kim had planned to stay only two or three days; so I was very lucky to have her stay here almost a week. Monday morning she flew over to London. Saying good-by is always a sad occasion, but I hope to see her soon again. It was the first time a member of the Family visited me in Spain. Who will be the next one?

Even though I do not write too often, I still feel close to you in our common effort of establishing our Father's Kingdom on earth.

Life Is a Preparation

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. The earth was without form and void. And darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the spirit of God was moving over the face of the waters. (Gen. 1:1-2)

God created the earth and sea, the growing things of creation, the day and night, the living creatures of the air, sea, and land and the angelic kingdom in careful, loving preparation for man. No detail was too small to receive His absolute attention. Everything had significance. From the dawn of their lives, Adam and Eve grew with a mission -- that of preparing their spirits and their love for the ultimate blessing: marriage to each other with God, out of which union children would be born through the energy and love Adam and Eve shared with God.

During their years of growth Adam and Eve must have faced what seemed to them perplexing situations. What did it mean when they bent over a stream to drink and found themselves looking up at themselves from the water's surface? Throughout their young years Adam and Eve grew according to natural spiritual laws, prepared to help them perfect their love for each other and for God.

Picture them growing. They probably made mistakes and sometimes acted foolishly, but dwelling as they were in a state of innocence and beauty, they can only be seen as growing reverently, in awe of the universe around them.

It is our job to live as Adam and Eve before the fall -- growing in innocence and beauty -- reverently, as we prepare to welcome the Bridegroom and become brides of God. While we remember that each moment is an eternal building block in the growth of our own spirits and of our movement, no small act should be done, no exchange of conversation should be made, no song should be sung, no story should be told, without reverence. Reverence does not mean somberness -- or a continual state of awe. It means awareness of the presence of God and the day and age we are preparing for.

Prayer, worship service, writing sermons and letters to our Family, studying, teaching -- these are all times when we feel the presence of God most intensely. At these times we are very sensitive to, and disturbed by, "irreverent noises." At all times we should be aware of ourselves and our homes as dwellings of God. Then all sounds we heard or made would be sounds of purpose, building, or sharing in a constructive way.

God is with us wherever we are, whatever we are doing, alone or with others, whether we are aware of Him or not. We have been born children of darkness. We must practice our awareness to become children of light. We must and can joyfully discipline ourselves to live in reverence.

Where does inner peace come from? From centering, steadying ourselves on God's new truth, His love, and His presence within us. Each moment must be an exercise in developing this steadiness, this maturity, this responsibility to God. We must constantly judge to see whether we be true to His image. How privileged we are to have the means to do this! This is not just for our own good. It is for the good of Father's entire mission.

We are so few in number. This means that each of us carries a larger responsibility. Each of us is responsible to be true to our Father and to His representatives. Only by preparing, by weeding out irreverence, will we be allowed to assume even greater responsibility.

This Center is a small nucleus in America which must serve as a true example to Americans. As we grow, the atmosphere here will be more and more firmly established and less easily changed. For the sake of those who come after us, whose lives are so important to our Father, let us train ourselves to be acutely aware of His presence and of the needs of each other.

Somewhere in each Center, someone is always working quietly or intently. Then let us move about quickly, quietly, and with purpose. Preparing in this way, at this Center where we are privileged to grow under His direct guidance, we can learn to move about Father's world with firm direction and purpose. Let us banish idleness and noisiness. Tradition is being established now. History is in the making.

We are sewing our spiritual robes in preparation for the Bridegroom. Let us be sure that the stitches are small, strong and neat -- sewn with gratitude and humility. Each moment is a preparation. Let us live our lives reverently and so carefully prepare a home for our Father as bright and fruitful as the one which He prepared for us.

MR. WON PIL KIM, FIRST DISCIPLE OF OUR MASTER,
VISITS HEADQUARTERS

The highlight of the month in Washington was the blessed visit of Mr. Won Pil Kim, the Master's first disciple.

Below is written his message as presented to the Unified Family November 12, 1967, at a special worship service-welcome party held for him.

His words speak for themselves.



Thinking of your wholehearted dedication and precious tears shed in this place, I couldn't help feeling hesitant to step into this place. Out of my joy in meeting you I immediately desired to hold your hands. But even that I was hesitant to do because I realized that you are heaven's most beloved ones and the fruit of God's loving care. Thinking of Father's Kingdom and His hope for you, His children, I immediately recall the passage of Scripture of God's speaking to Moses in which He asked him to take off his shoes because the land he was on was holy ground.

Often people ask how long I've been with our Leader and when I first heard this message. Then I answer I followed him when I was young. Now I realize it has been twenty-one years. I see their surprise to find it has been so long. Whenever I give that answer, I feel ashamed of myself. Although I have known His Will for so long, I don't seem to have done anything greater than other people. It is not necessarily so important to have known His Will first and to have followed in early stages. The important thing is how much we do His Will and please Him now, not in the past, but now.

Though it cannot happen, what if after all His work, God's dispensation were not fulfilled? And our Leader's sweat and tears over forty years -- supposing this is not fulfilled? What will happen? When we think of this, the important thing is not what we have done in the past, but what we do now and will do in the future. It is essential that His Will be fulfilled. In this sense I have seen in Japan and America the evidence of His ceaseless labor in every direction, and the evidence of the Leader's hard work. Thereby I see God once again, and the living feature of the Father in every direction.

An antique may have historical value and people may treasure it, but I don't want to become an antique. I rather wanted to progress constantly rather than this. Because I didn't want to be an antique, I always examined myself in the light of what God would like me to be. Therefore, I was never satisfied where I was. This doesn't mean I complained about my position, but I was hesitant to remain in a satisfied position.

You may not realize how much our Leader cares for you just by word of mouth. In Japan and also in Korea I saw our Leader getting up from his bed several times in the night to kneel and pray for the Americans.

Therefore, if I don't serve you, reflecting his heart to you, I will get spanked. The reason God has called us is not to be happy with us alone, but to bring all humanity to be with Him. Therefore Father's hope is not only with us but for all mankind. Realizing His hard labor, let us find many people for Him, that He will be glorified by many.

On behalf of the True Parents, and Mr. Eu, the President, I greet you. May God's grace and the Parents' love be with all of you.

I am the firstborn of six children and was born October 19, 1950, in Horn, Austria. My father is Catholic, yet we children were raised in the Protestant faith, since my mother is a Protestant. In our early childhood Mother taught us to pray and also, later, when we went to school, she prayed with us every morning.

After I finished grade school, our minister arranged for me to go to Vienna to attend a school for housekeeping, run by the Church. Soon I realized that not everything in this home met my expectations. There was hatred and jealousy among the teachers. They still prayed, yet I could feel that their hearts weren't there. There was only one teacher I liked very much, Romana Maierhofer; and because of her I stayed at the school another year, upon my mother's request.

After Romana had left the home, I was forbidden to get in touch with her. They even threatened to put me into a reformatory if I did. From this time on I didn't want to stay in this home any longer. I felt that this is the truth, and I have belonged to the Family for some time already.
