Rick Hunter (Portland, Maine) - "I've made good friends with the religious editor of the major newspaper syndicate. Also made friends with the Assistant Dean of Students on the Portland Campus of the University of Maine. I just moved into a center after a long struggle to find the right place. The living and dining rooms join, looking similar to the north and south rooms at Upshur."

Bill Torrey (Raleigh, North Carolina) - "My main work since arriving has been directed towards finding a place of residence... Witnessing has been mainly conducted on campus. I hope to start teaching this week on campus. Religion is a major concern here in this area."

Ernie Stewart (Miami, Florida) - has been looking for a suitable house. Until then he has found a trailer.

Daniel Stein (Billings, Montana) - has rented a two-bedroom house. "I have attended 6 different Christian services. I've developed a simple questionnaire that I plan on using in one-to-one street witnessing." The Billings Gazette carried an article on the Unification Church.

John Harries (Oklahoma City, Oklahoma) - street preaches downtown every day. He has attracted enough attention to be photographed and interviewed by the Oklahoma City newspaper. "The first man I taught is a psychologist studying Indians. He was donating blood plasma in the chair next to me... Hitchhiking has caused me to meet some of my best contacts... I have occasionally been lent cars and given food."

Mike Roth (Albuquerque, New Mexico) - "I am praying hard, witnessing, practicing my lecture, setting conditions, and planning for the future." Mike was interviewed and photographed by the local paper.

Richard Parks (Indianapolis, Indiana) - has found a three-bedroom house. "Butler University and I.U. and Purdue extensions are the city campuses. Climate of students is pretty conservative. There is no "hip" section of the city -- most longhairs make it a practice of steering clear of Indianapolis."

Peter Mullen (Wilmington, Delaware) - spends four hours a day street preaching.

Marlene Dudik (Portland, Oregon) - "Portland Center's experience with the One World Crusade Bus Team was wonderfully revitalizing... A number of people are in different stages of hearing the Principle, and we are holding study sessions twice a week. Since the bus team's departure last week, we've witnessed mainly at Lloyd Center (shopping center) and on the streets, where we've gotten the best responses from young people."

Ted Casten (Burlington, Vermont) - "Since Burlington is a small town (38,000 people), I have been very cautious. I specialize in long talks on any subject because many people I see every day... Could not begin to sum up or express my thoughts on this mission so far. Have been here only ten days and it seems like ten years. There have been tremendous down periods and some high periods... Here is the KEY point, I feel. If I am to be successful here, it is necessary to put out 100% physical and spiritual effort. For One World Crusade to succeed, there must be national unity. The mails must be flooded with letters from pioneer to pioneer, and from San Francisco, Berkeley, and Washington people to each other.

Everyone in the movement must start to unite with each other, especially those that they do not know or have not had contact with. We have to learn to communicate... We must unite with each other like the life of our country depends on it."

Mike Cardin (Des Moines, Iowa) - "I spoke at campus ministries meeting, and church dialogue sessions and had an article in a paper...."

Julie Lewis (Columbia, South Carolina) - has taught three Chapter I's and is involved in a Catholic study group.

Judy Barnes (Louisville, Kentucky) - "After many tears, fasting, and prayer, plus much searching, a center was finally located."

Nancy Callahan (New Orleans, Louisiana) - was visited by Al Tulley from San Francisco.

John Doroski (Austin, Texas) - "I slept the first night in a three-bedroom house that I hope will be too small in a very short time... I have names of about 25 people in Houston with a couple of real good prospects. Also the radio stations of one of the colleges has been attempting to get in touch with me for an interview."

Kathy Goldman (Salt Lake City, Utah) - "Equipped with a single fact sheet, it was much easier than expected to call radio and TV stations and get preliminary appointments... TV and radio have to give a certain amount of time daily to public service announcements."

Lorenzo Gaztanaga (Trenton, New Jersey) - is preparing a public street lecture.

Diane Frink (Memphis, Tennessee) - "Memphis is a good city. Its population is nearly a million. There are many universities, training schools, parks and shopping areas. I feel it will be a good city for Principle work."

Gil Fox (Birmingham, Alabama) - "The Birmingham Center has moved to its new quarters at 2620 Highland Avenue. There is one young girl of Catholic background who is deeply concerned about her life and also moved by Principle."

Jack Hart (Atlanta, Georgia) - has a part-time job selling Time-Life Books through telephone soliciting.

Mike Richardson (Charleston, West Virginia) - is staying at the "Y" and has a part-time job washing dishes at Rose's Cafeteria. "I am feeling quite well as Father is trying His best to get things done...I've been interviewed by the religious editor of the Charleston Daily Mail...West Virginia is very rural, cultural and corrupt. The people have been swindled by past governors and violence has been used as a means of keeping investigations quiet...The people really identify as West Virginians."

Sandy Singleton (Chicago, Illinois) - "Chicago is overwhelmingly a Jewish city, though there are many Germans here. There is also a small Puerto-Rican and Spanish population, but the streets are ruled by the Young Latin Lords...The black population is mostly in the South Side...Witnessing will be confined to the North Side (where we live, mostly Jewish), Evanston (liberal community like Georgetown), and Lake Shore (literally the shore of the lake) until we can get a car and go to the University of Chicago."

Susan Finnegan (997 East Livingston Avenue, Columbus, Ohio) - was given the name Robert Dumont, 1156 Shade Hill Drive, Columbus, Ohio, as a contact and hasn't been able to locate him. She wants more information on him.

John Jones (Fargo, North Dakota) - "Things are going pretty well for me. They don't rent houses here in the spring, but I found one that is about 12 blocks from downtown and the same distance from the NDSU campus...I am now working 15 hours a week as a night janitor at the YMCA for \$1.50 an hour. Fargo and Morehead, Minnesota, are twin cities on the Red River with a combined population of over 80,000. They have three colleges (NDSU, Concordia, and Morehead State), nine radio stations, and three TV stations."

Linda Marchant (Las Vegas, Nevada) - reports that a new member has joined in Las Vegas.

Patti MacWilliams (Madison, Wisconsin) has taught Chapter I to a grad student in accounting. She is teaching a class at the student union of the University of Wisconsin.

Terry McGuire (Minneapolis, Minnesota) - "Well, I'm all in and set. I stayed with an old college friend and his parents for a week while I found a place. I've rented an apartment ten blocks from the University and about ten blocks from downtown Minneapolis."

Report of Mobile Team # 1 (Northern Bus) - Portland, Oregon - "In summation, our daily witnessing efforts brought 45 people, eleven of whom heard the conclusion. Most of their reactions were favorable...Joseph, Marlene, and Mark made a one-hour tape for a radio interview on KISN. This interview prompted many questions about One World Crusade: (1) Objective (2) Membership (3) Organization...Also, Joseph, Marlene and Mark made two one-half hour tapes. The first was on the One World Crusade; the second concerned marriage. The tapes will be aired sometime after Easter on KPFM and KPAM and possibly on two hundred other stations."

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
