Frank Kaufmann is the director of the Inter Religious Federation for World Peace (IRFWP) (originally a Unification Church ecumenical organization).^[1] He served as editor in chief of the IRFWP's academic journal *Dialogue and Alliance* from 1998 until 2009, during which time, in 2004 was named as one of the top ten religion journals (out of 650) by an independent panel commissioned by the [American Theological Library Association](#) (ATLA)^[2]

In 2007, Kaufmann was nominated for Hofstra University's first [Guru Nanak Interfaith Prize](#).^[3]

In 2011, Kaufmann established [Fitial Projects](#) ^[4] as the umbrella corporation for his humanitarian and scholarly efforts.
