Topic: Subject and Object Relations, and Giving and Receiving

Dr Bellavance is a Global Vice-President of Sun Moon University (SMU), Oceania Coordinator for the International Association of Academicians for Peace, Vice-President of UPF Australia, and Chair of UPF Victoria.

During his presentations, John explained the importance of Dr Moon's understanding about the 'Principles of Subject and Object and Giving and

Receiving' for creating a peaceful world. These two principles exemplify the importance of the interconnectedness of life, namely, Systems Thinking. For example, the body is maintained through the giving and receiving between cells and organs. Systems exhibit the following characteristics:

- All elements are required and are integrated with the broader purpose.
- Smaller systems can form bigger systems. For example, the smaller family system is also part of the larger social system.

Systems thinking is vital for us to see connections with others and our natural environment. Through our giving and receiving actions, we raise our consciousness and understanding of the world and change the world when we interact with it. The failure to understand this principle of interconnectedness underlies some of the current misconceptions of science, politics, economics, philosophy, and spirituality. Lastly, John spoke about the importance of the family in achieving the UN Sustainable Development Goals.



Anne Bellavance

Topic: Conjugal Love

Anne is President of WFWP Australia and an International Vice-President of WFWP International, representing Oceania and S.E. Asia.

Continuing the theme of giving and receiving, Anne shared that the most important criteria for a successful relationship with one's partner is how we respond to each other and change ourselves for the other, because the number one cause for breakdown in a relationship is turning away from the needs of the other.



Additionally, happy couples make happy families. Families are the basic training ground for both parents and children to develop good character, good citizenship, and learning to live for the sake of others.

The emotional, physical, and economic benefits that marriage brings to both individuals and society cannot be overstated. We now have ample data demonstrating how family breakdown affects the stability of communities in terms of the increased poverty, crime, drug, and alcohol abuse.

Finally, Anne spoke shared that the complexity of our modern culture has made the simple endeavours of building successful marriages and families more complicated and more challenging than ever before.

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During his presentations, John explained the importance of Dr Moon's understanding about the 'Principles of Subject and Object and Giving and Receiving' for creating a peaceful world. 


MISSION AND VISION


PRESENTER

Topic: The Foundations of a Good Marriage – Part 1

Dr John Bellavance is a Global Vice-President of Sun Moon University (SMU), Oceania Coordinator for the International Association of Academicians for Peace, Vice-President of UPF Australia, and Chair of UPF Victoria.

During his presentations, John explained that once we understand that love is the central value of life, then we need to find

out how to realise the ideal love in our relationships. This presentation covered: 1. On the foundation of love, the values of truth, beauty and goodness are formed. 2. Giving and receiving love is a vital practice that underpins happiness and well-being. 3. Joy remains dormant until we exchange love.



Topic: Social Challenges to Family Life and the Four Spheres of Love

Pastor Daniel Meadows is the Victorian Director of FFWPU Australia. He discussed the challenges faced by modern families and positive ways to deal with these. He covered:

1. The change that has had the most far-reaching consequences on family life is separation and divorce.



2. It is interesting to note that economists are the ones suggesting that we need to foster and support strong families.

3. The Family – An Integrative Whole and the Four Spheres of Love.



Topic: The Foundations of a Good Marriage – Part 2

John covered three topics in this presentation:

1. The first value and practice that underpins a relationship is living for the sake of the others, otherwise known as altruism. The essence of moral authority is service, namely subordinating oneself for the sake of a higher purpose or showing love for another.

2. The simple principle is that genuine and sustainable love is realised by giving first, while false love is self-serving.

3. Both self-centred and changing love, and genuine and unchanging love exist. Changing love fluctuates according to the interests of the moment. Because it is self-centred, it changes.

Strengthening relationships through the marriage renewal rededication and interfaith blessing was the final part of the program.




The marriage renewal involved opening remarks, a toast, a water blessing, interfaith benedictions and vows of marriage renewal.


Pastor Nikki has been involved in Worship Ministry for 38 years and pastoral ministry for 15 years, experiencing every aspect of church ministry.

The program concluded with the Presentation of the Ambassador for Peace Award, presented to Awes Amin. He has a Bachelor of Environmental Health Management from Swinburne University, a Post Graduate Diploma in Low-Cost Infrastructure from the Institute of Housing Studies in the Netherlands, a Bachelor of Environmental Sciences from King Abdul-Aziz University in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, and a Diploma of Animal Production and Processing from the

Institute of Animal Sciences in Somalia.

He has worked on refugee Settlement for the Australia Red Cross. His current position is the CEO ASMA Environmental Services, Melbourne, Australia. In the 1990s, Awes worked with as a Senior Administrative Assistant for the United Nations in Somalia and assisted UN political and humanitarian officers and UN troops,

and coordinated international organisations, community leaders and local authorities to provide assistance in relief management, political stability, and security restoration. As a team leader of Somalian NGO, he managed relief programs and assisted international organizations in the implementation of relief operations.

In Australia, Awes has served the Somali community and other East African communities as Chairperson of Committee Management Ethnic Communities



Council Inc., and as Chairperson of Committee Management of Somali Inter-Riverine Community Development Association. He worked to establish a community centre that provides various services to the community, to operate as a resource centre for the community, to offer guidance and information, including cultural backgrounds to service providers about the community, to enable youth participation in sports and recreational activities and empower young people, to encourage and empower women to engage in social life in Australia, and to provide support and assistance to new arrivals, migrants, and refugees.

TOPIC: Great Leaders are catalysts for rewriting futures and transforming how situations occur.

A not-for-profit pioneer and volunteer for 43 years across Australia, Canada, and the USA, Anne is committed to fostering a 'culture of heart' rooted in the motto, 'Living for the Sake of Others', the soul and values of Women's Federation for World Peace International.

Passionate about advancing women through 'leadership of the heart', Anne mentors' women, supports community organisations, and advocates for those they serve.

Why do some people become masters at things while other don't achieve their potential greatness? Winston Churchill was a great speaker, yet he stuttered from childhood. Helen Keller became a great writer yet lost her hearing and sight as an infant. What is this special 'X' Factor that creates master's and can take your performance to a whole new level? For the Master, the 'X' factor is how situations occur to them. The master can imagine creating a new future of possibilities and heightened performance.

Anne elaborated on the three 'X' factors that enable master's to do things others can't do and wouldn't imagine doing. Firstly, altering the way situations are perceived is key. When achieved, the future shifts, revealing opportunities where others see chaos. Secondly, masters excel in managing conversations that empower others to re-shape their future instead of living into a default future driven by past experiences. Thirdly, masters facilitate a collaborative approach, allowing others to contribute to, and shape the future. A great leader creates the space for that future to occur.

Corrinne Armour CSP Author of 'Leaders Who Ask: Building Fearless Cultures by telling less and asking more, and 'Developing Direct Reports: Taking the Guesswork Out of Leading Leaders.



TOPIC: Fearless Leadership - Untapped potential. Taking action in times of challenge.

Entertaining, provocative, and inspiring. With Certified Speaking Professional (CSP), Corrinne is industry recognised for her experience and professional capability amongst Australia's leading speakers. Underpinned by 20 years in and out of board rooms working with senior leaders, Corrinne brings Fearless Leadership® to life.

We were truly inspired by Corrinne's energy, wisdom, and courage. On her first night in a refugee camp on the Thai Myanmar border, Corrinne was filled with fear. Yet, a transformative moment occurred when a 4-year-old girl, who didn't speak English, reached out to her with an outstretched hand and eye contact. This simple gesture transcended language barriers and connected them on a deeply human level, stripped of modern society's pretences.

Corrinne asked, "Who can lead you out of fear and give you connection?" It's in these moments of connection that we find our best selves. A fearless leader, she explained, needs "weapons of mass connection." It starts with connection; trust holds it together and generates better outcomes. Fearless leadership is about having conversations that build trust and connection.



Heather Yelland – President and Founder, The Elevation Company



TOPIC: Elevating Leadership - leading by heart.

With formal training in arts, psychology, family, systems theory and business, Heather has been a 'people' specialist for over 30 years. She is a leading authority in Values Based Leadership and is a respected thought leader in the international arena of consulting, business and corporate innovation, and coaching.

We loved Heather's humour, energy, and insightful inspiration. As an intuitive and concise speaker and facilitator, she has a unique ability to engage with individuals in a large group, using stories to drive her message home. Heather emphasised that the human experience is the 'why' for connection.

Despite having four degrees, Heather shared that raising eight children taught her more than any academic achievement. She reminded us that there is always time for what we value, stressing that we are human beings, not human doers. While we can approach business and leadership with our heads, our hearts won't be satisfied. The longest distance is between our brain and our heart! People want to know, be loved, seen, heard and got!

Heather's closing remarks were powerful: "Trust the universe (the Divine), trust yourself, and trust those around you. Trust begins with trusting myself. Energy from the heart makes you want to learn it. Be vulnerable and create space for others to do the same. Be an authentic leader, living the life you were born to make. Be all of you!"

TOPIC: Heart-Driven Leadership: Cultivating Trust and Unity Across Diverse Communities.

Lydia is dedicated to carving out a unique and versatile career as a global Thought Leader. She is a Conversationalist and Entrepreneur, balancing community work with her love for presenting, hosting, speaking, and moderating panels. Passionate about inspiring the next generation to be purpose-driven, Lydia uses the power of connection, communication, and education to make a unique impact on the world.

Lydia emphasised that emerging leaders often don't see themselves as leaders and shared her own experience of overcoming fear standing before us.

As a first generation Australian, she highlighted the importance of established leaders creating opportunities for others. She stressed the need for safe spaces where new Australians feel accepted, fostering collaboration and allowing them to gain experience.

Lydia believes sincerity resonates with people and that leaders should cultivate trust through transparency, integrity, and empathy. Being a bridge means recognising your privilege and creating access for others. Be sincere and be the bridge!





These networking opportunities clearly demonstrate the power of Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 17: Partnerships for the Goals.


By collaborating and looking beyond personal interests, we can collectively achieve all 16 SDGs.



A visit to the Chuncheon City Korean war memorial, and the Ethiopian museum followed. Both events were covered by two local newspapers.





Theme: Food Safety, Hygiene, and Waste Management

June 27 - 28 | Honiara, Solomon Islands

OVERVIEW

- OWFWPSI, IN CONSULTATION WITH HONIARA CITY COUNCIL (HCC) HEALTH TEAM FACILITATED A TWO-DAY WORKSHOP.
- THE TRAINING FOCUSED ON THE BEST PRACTICES ON HOW TO HANDLE FOOD SAFELY AND HOW TO PROPERLY DISPOSE OF WASTE.



WFWP-SI, in collaboration with the Honiara City Council (HCC) Health Team, facilitated a two-day workshop on Food Safety, Hygiene, and Waste Management.



Raising awareness about proper food handling and waste disposal is essential for the health of families and the public, especially for those selling food commercially.

The workshop attracted a diverse group of about 40 participants, including two males, high school girls, women, and around 12 facilitators. This training is mandatory for anyone seeking a permit to sell or cater food to schools or the

public. The goal is to empower women aspiring to become food vendors or caterers. Upon completion, participants received certificates, and those interested in becoming food vendors will have their kitchens inspected by the HCC Health team to ensure they meet the necessary standards for legal operation.



It was the first time WFWP-SI members and guests received such training, adding substantial value by teaching best practices in food safety and waste management. As the population of the Solomon Islands grows, the demand for food vendors increases. This training empowers community members to create additional income streams, supporting their families and communities, and contributing to national development, safety, and peace.
